1. BACKGROUND

This Consolidated Sector Report is the fourth report generated by Tokelau that recounts progress made against National indicators and targets as outlined in the Tokelau National Strategic Plan (TNSP). As part of the national reporting and monitoring framework the Consolidated Sector Report has allowed Tokelau to track progress made on the individual indicators and targets as well as within the four outcome areas: good governance; infrastructure development; human development and sustainability. Indicators and targets set out in other frameworks to which Tokelau is party to have also been amalgamated in to the TNSP Results Framework from which the Sector Reports were derived.

As part of its role, the PMU coordinates individual progress reports from villages and departments on a six monthly basis. This information is then used to develop the Consolidated Sector Report. As stated in previous reports, the compilation of this Consolidated Sector Report continues to enhance Tokelau's reporting and monitoring commitments and provides a sound basis for good decision making. The completion of the June 2014 report has been made possible through the coordinated efforts of all the departments and one village who submitted their individual reports for the period under review. Their continuous support in this regard is acknowledged. It should be noted that at the time of finalisation, reports from Fakaofo and Nukunonu had not been received by the PMU. Therefore the attached appendices and following graphs do not include progress made by these two atolls in relation to the TNSP.

2. PROGRESS AGAINST TNSP TARGETS

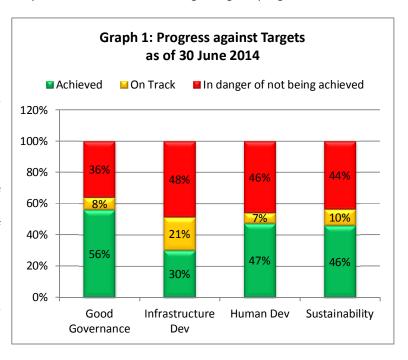
The updated TNSP Results Framework is attached as Appendix 1 and reflects progress against each of the indicators as of 30 June 2014. This progress is the culmination of information extracted from the individual sector reports received for the period under review. The achievement of some targets and indicators relies on the input provided by more than one sector and where the outputs are realised at the village level. In such cases, the sector report template for all the relevant sectors included these targets and the information recorded by all the individual sectors regarding the progress made has been

concluded from the all the comments provided.

In summary, two graphs have been completed to show the progress against the targets for each of the four outcome areas for the TNSP and overall progress for all targets.

Graph 1 shows the rate of progress against the set targets under each of the four pillars of development as prioritised in the TNSP. In summary, as at 30 June 2014:

• 64% of **Good Governance** targets have been achieved or are on track. 36% of these



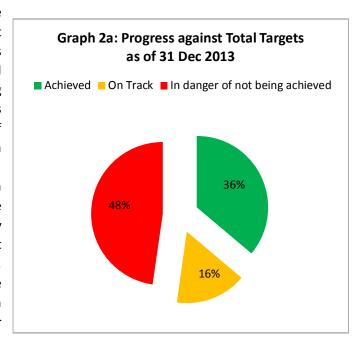
targets are in danger of not being achieved.

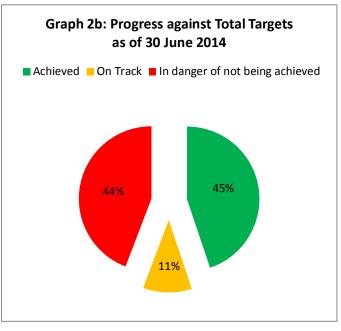
- 51% of **Infrastructure Development** targets have been achieved or are on track. 48% of targets in Infrastructure Development are in danger of not being achieved by 30 June 2015;
- 54% of **Human Development** targets have been achieved or are on track and 46% are in danger of not being achieved.
- 56% of **Sustainability** targets have been achieved or are on track while 36% are in danger of not being achieved

Graph 2b shows the rate of progress against all targets for the TNSP up to **30 June 2014.** This graph shows that up to 30 June 2014, 56% of all TNSP targets have been achieved or are on target to being achieved within the TNSP timeframe while 44% are in danger of not being achieved by June 2015. This is

compared to Graph 2a which shows the rate of progress against all targets as at the end of **December 2013**. There has been a 7% increase in targets achieved and 5% for targets on track to being achieved. This positive movement is attributed to factors such as availability of data / information for targets which previously lacked any reported progress. In addition, monitoring and verification activities conducted by the PMU have identified several targets that have already been achieved but were reported as not achieved by the respective Departments. This was mainly due misunderstanding and misinterpretation of the targets and requirements for achieving them. It should also be noted that several of the targets being reported as not achieved are expected to be reported as achieved in the December 2014 report. The reason for this is that these targets are required to be achieved on an annual basis and it has been noted from previous progress reports that activities pertaining to these targets are usually conducted during the last half of the calendar year. It is however important that respective sectors ensure that these activities are included in their work plans for the last six months of 2014.

With less than twelve months left for the current national strategic plan, Tokelau





needs to identify those targets it can realistically achieve by the end of June 2015 and take measures to ensure that these are included as part of relevant work plans and budgets.

In addition to targets relating to Human Development it is also crucial that attention be given to targets relating to the legal and regulatory framework. For instance, targets relating to the development, endorsement and implementation of policy documents, plans and frameworks remain outstanding. About 78% of these targets are in danger of not being achieved and perhaps it should be considered whether Tokelau seeks additional technical support in fast tracking these targets.

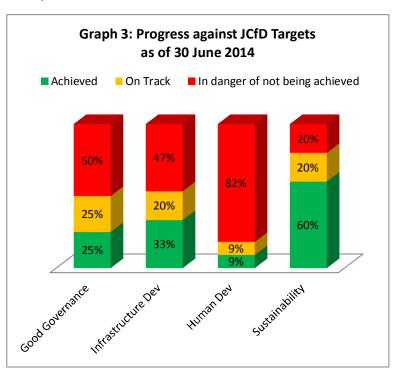
Continuously strengthening good governance structures and processes will also accelerate the overall progress of TNSP Targets and improving these areas will have a significant impact on the overall standard of living for residents in Tokelau.

3. PROGRESS AGAINST JCfD TARGETS

Prior to the TNSP, Tokelau has provided periodic sector progress reports to their development partners such as New Zealand and UNDP. In efforts to streamline monitoring and reporting requirements these targets are incorporated into the TNSP Results Framework and provides basis for the Consolidated Progress Reports. This however is the first report that features a specific section that recounts progress against JCfD targets. An updated JCfD framework is attached to this report as Appendix 2 while Graph 3 illustrates this progress against the four TNSP pillars as at the end of June 2014.

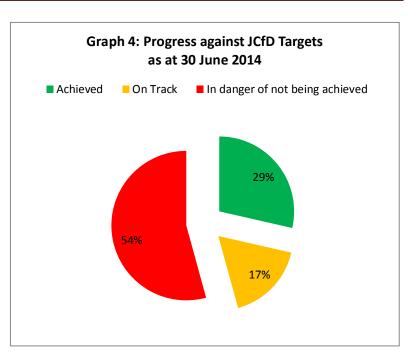
In summary:

- 50% of the JCfD targets under the Good Governance pillar have been achieved or are on track while 50% are at risk of not being achieved by the end of June 2015
- 53% of JCfD targets relating to Infrastructure Development have been achieved or are on track while 47% are at risk of not being achieved by the end of June 2015,
- 18% of JCfD targets relating to Human Development have been achieved or are on track while 82% are at risk of not being achieved by the end of June 2015,
- 80% of JCfD targets for Sustainability have been achieved or are on track while 20% are at risk of not being achieved by the end of June 2015.



Graph 4 shows the rate of progress against total JCfD Targets up to 30 June 2014. As illustrated, 46% of all JCfD targets have been achieved or are on target to being achieved within the TNSP timeframe while 54% are in danger of not being achieved by June 2015.

With the JCfD due to be reviewed it is timely for discussions to take place on programme areas that New Zealand will engage in over the next JCfD period.



4. FINANCIAL

The Audit Reports for FY 2011 and FY 2013 still remain outstanding and have yet to be signed off. Delays in finalising this process are attributed to changes to the designated audit team coupled with the need to resolve some accounting technical issues. It is expected that these reports are signed off before the end of 2014.

At the time of finalising this report, the usual Financial Report generated by the Department of Finance had not been issued as reports from specific villages and departments remained outstanding. Again it is crucial that up to date information / data is made available in a timely fashion if Tokelau is to make sound decisions for the betterment of life of its people.

5. KEY CHALLENGES

5.1 Realisation of National Targets

With the current TNSP coming to an end it is pertinent that Tokelau reflects on the progress made to date and considers whether or not the remaining targets will be achieved or how much it will endeavour to achieve by June 2015. It is also necessary that Tokelau ensures that the needed processes and resources to facilitate the achievement of these targets are in place and enforced at all levels of the TPS.

Health and Education continue to lag behind in terms of achieving set targets due mainly to two contributing factors; 1) unavailability of up to date and relevant data and 2) the majority of targets associated with these two sectors relate to a change in people's behaviour and attitudes. Investment of time, effort and resources is urgently needed in these two areas in order to bring about the improved quality of life that Tokelau aspires for her people. With the remaining time left on the current TNSP it is strongly encouraged that efforts are carried out to ensure that effective information systems that will allow the extraction of data required for reporting against future targets are put in place. Finalisation

and implementation of the Education and Health Reviews is also crucial in moving these two sectors forward.

The subject of ownership particularly of the TNSP is a crucial one and has been continuously raised. With the TNSP into its final year of implementation, it is a grave concern that the lack of ownership of this important National document remains an issue. An internal review of the consultation process used during the development of the current TNSP should identify areas for improvement to ensure inclusive consultation for the new TNSP.

5.2 Planning, Reporting and Budgeting

The importance of planning at all levels of the TPS cannot be over emphasized. The completion of village development and department corporate plans that show clear linkage to the TNSP still remains a crucial and yet outstanding activity. Putting in place simple but necessary planning processes and tools will ensure that Tokelau is better able to manage its limited resources while at the same time implementing achievable activities within each FY.

Timely and quality reporting remains an issue with the majority of Departments and Villages not meeting reporting requirements. During the compilation of this report two villages had not completed their individual sector progress reports. Having in place systems that hold Department and Village staff accountable will contribute to ensuring that planned activities are implemented and that resources are utilised wisely. Additionally, making reporting requirements for TNSP mandatory and an integral part of performance management review for senior managers responsible for sectors and village offices would ensure that the issue of timely and quality reporting is of utmost importance.

Having budget submissions and approvals tied to Village and Department plans and performance will go a long way in meeting TNSP targets that remain outstanding and will enhance Tokelau's reporting and accountability obligations.

5.3 Human Resource Capacity and Capability

The availability of sufficient skilled, qualified and experienced workers particularly those with technical abilities remains a challenge for departments and villages as the demand for improved service delivery increases.

Continuing efforts to link village/department human resource needs to the Scholarships Policy and Scheme also plays a critical role in ensuring these gaps can be filled in the future. Of equal importance is ensuring that students placed on scholarship are successful in completing their studies and that they return to Tokelau to work in relevant sectors.

The development of Tokelau's Human Resource Capacity Development Plan (HRCDP) and the establishment of a robust staff performance management / review process will also contribute to addressing the HR challenges. Continued capacity development is also vital in ensuring that members of the TPS continue to be well equipped to provide quality services in their respective fields of work. However, equally important is the need to foster professional and ethical behaviour and attitude of staff in the carrying out of their assigned duties and responsibilities.

5.4 Operational

The issues of isolation and Tokelau's harsh environment will always present as key challenges for effective and efficient performance and/or delivery of services. Efficient communication and information systems as reflected in transport and telecommunications continue to be vital if Tokelau is to overcome the challenges it faces due to its location. The need for improving and strengthening coordinated efforts from all Departments and Villages remains. This will be assisted greatly with the development of better information and communication systems that will lessen the impacts of the isolation issue. Maintaining effective communication system with NZ and other development partners will also minimise the impacts of isolation.

Prudent planning and sound decision making for the transport needs of Tokelau is important given the many challenges associated with this sector and how it impacts on other sectors and their performance. Coordinated efforts between the Department of Transport and the Villages are paramount to addressing the many challenges faced by the transport sector.

Developing a sound legal framework that consists of relevant legislation, policies and regulations will provide the mandate for each of the sectors. While there has been progress with regards to some legislation, policies and regulations there remains substantial work to be completed in this area. Clarity of employee roles and responsibilities and the need to implement an effective performance management review process for both Departments and Villages continues to remain.

6. KEY HIGHLIGHTS

The following are some key highlights that have been reported for the period under review:

6.1 Education

Completion of the Report on the National Evaluation of Education Provision in Tokelau. NZ is now working with the Department of Education on a 5 year work programme to help Tokelau to implement recommendations in the ERO report.

6.2 Energy

- ▶ 91.8% reduction in diesel consumption
- ➤ Signing of the TESS Project Document with UNDP in May 2014. A total project budget of USD307,000 has been allocated under this project up until 31 December 2015.
- New generators have been procured and delivered to each station. Installation is expected to be finalised before the end of 2014 and this will enhance the backup system for the provision of reliable electricity.

6.3 Engagement in International Meetings

- Successful hosting of the Forum Fisheries Council (FFC) 89 Officials Meeting in Nukunonu in May and the FFC10 Ministerial Meeting in Atafu at the end of June.
- Preparations for Tokelau's engagement in the SIDS Conference in Apia in August.

6.4 Finance

- The PEFA initial self-assessment completed in March and indicated that Tokelau is above average in this area.
- Exercise for cleaning up of outstanding debtors for Teletok completed
- Initial revision of the Tokelau's Budget template to align activities to TNSP undertaken in consultation with PMU

- Quarterly invoicing of the Cooperative Stores was implemented as well as revising repayment schedules for overdue debts which are now being paid off.
- Discussions held with the three Faipule on the development and implementation of the Tokelau Development Bank

6.5 Good Governance

- ➤ National Good Governance Training for 18 Tokelau trainers completed.
- Tokelau Good Governance Training Manual compiled and translated.

6.6 Health

- > 70 % reduction in the number of TPRS referrals from June 2013
- > Piloting of the PEN protocol to enhance NCD detection and management
- > Recruitment of IMS staff to commence work on the Information Management System
- > Secondment of IT TALO Manager to install the Med Tech Server and other equipment at the new hospital in Nukunonu
- Population of data and information into the Information Management System for Apia, Fakaofo and Atafu
- Completion of the Health Sector Review with final draft to be discussed and approved by Council and General Fono

6.7 Human Resources

- Secondee from Statistics NZ to support TNSO. Intend to now recruit a Tokelauan to be trained by the secondee.
- > Recruitment of the General Manager, Teletok. Recruit expected to commence in August 2014.
- Implementation of public consultations on all three villages with Taupulega, Fatupaepae, general workers and public servants on the HRCDP

6.8 Legal

- > Completion and submission of Tokelau Birth & Deaths Registration Rules to General Fono
- Review of bilingual registration forms
- Publication and distribution of the Judicial Annual Report 2012/2013

6.9 Ongoing Capacity Development

- Local Legal Teams conducted awareness workshops on services and legal systems available for reporting crimes.
- Virgin Oil Production Training conducted in Atafu for 3 participants.
- Participation of all Biosecurity Officers at a Water Quality workshop held in Suva, Fiji which focused on building capacity and ways of enhancing the quality of water.

6.10 Sports Development

- Tokelau participation in K-Sport ITTF Oceania Table Tennis Championships in Bendigo, Australia.
- First time participation by Tokelau in the Oceania Wrestling Championships in Pago Pago, American Samoa where Tokelau won Gold medal.
- > Tokelau National Sports Coordinator awarded the Oceania National Olympic Committee Best Student of the year award.

6.11 Transport

- Installation and implementation of the Transport Ticketing Software and procedures to ensure accuracy in passenger manifests and revenue collected
- Engagement of Waugh Infrastructure Management Ltd for preparation of the Tokelau National Asset Management Plan
- No boating incidences reported for the period

7. CONCLUSION

The development and implementation of simple planning and monitoring tools has allowed Tokelau to track the progress of TNSP implementation over the last 2 years. Departments and Villages are commended for the marked progress to date with approximately 56% of total TNSP targets being achieved or are on track to be achieved. This is in itself a big achievement for Tokelau given that this is the first TNSP being put in place to guide the development on quality of life for residents on Tokelau and taking into consideration the delayed implementation of the Plan.

With less than twelve months remaining for the current TNSP, it is crucial that Tokelau reflects on how the TNSP will evolve beyond 2015. Information currently being gathered and collated under the development of the "Quality of Life" Work Plan as well as the independent Evaluation of Tokelau's Country Programme will provide good direction for the TNSP beyond 2015. In reviewing the TNSP, it is important that consideration be given to other development frameworks / agendas that Tokelau is committed to.

The need to foster a good planning and reporting culture throughout all levels of the TPS and linking this to processes such as budgeting and performance management remains evident. Enacting good governance practices and complying with established procedures and processes will contribute to improving the services throughout all levels of governance.

Despite the many challenges that confront the progress of development of Tokelau, significant achievements have been made over the period of TNSP implementation. It has required time, resources and commitment for Tokelau to achieve almost 60% of its TNSP targets. It is acknowledged that many needed changes remain for the continuous improvement in the delivery of service and progress in development. Work undertaken under the Quality of Life Work Plan together with the upcoming reviews of development programmes, including the TNSP will add much value to instituting these changes and further facilitate the expected progress.
