This morning, Tokelau Climate Change Programme Manager, Ms Paula Faiva, from the Ministry of Climate, Oceans, and Resilience (MiCORE) joined New Zealand Minister for Climate Change James Shaw and Te Papa officials at their head office to celebrate Te Papa CEMARS (Certified Emissions Measurement and Reduction Scheme) certification, cementing Te Papa's commitment to further reduce the museum's carbon footprint.

Te Papa Senior Curator Pacific Cultures, Sean Mallon, spoke of a 2017 co-collecting trip to Tokelau, as part of "Project IKA: Innovation – Knowledge – Atoll Life." The aim of Project IKA is to activate Te Papa's core philosophy of Mana Taonga and be innovative in highly visible ways among New Zealand communities and stakeholders. Project IKA and the objects collected highlight the experiences of Tokelauans and how they are responding to, and living with, the effects of climate change. Ms Faiva spoke of Tokelau's climate challenge, and their response to it. She said Project IKA is a prime example of how crucial it is that everyone plays their part – whether they be a small island nation, or a national museum. Added together, small actions can make important differences.

The highly cultural valued items collected during the co-collecting trip to Tokelau in 2017 will become part of

the climate change component of Te Papa's new exhibition to be launched in May 2019.
